The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 30 June 2023.

Principal Activity and Review of the Business

The objectives of the charity are to advance education and relieve poverty by establishing, conducting and maintaining a children's home in Tanzania with a view to providing care and universal education to children, to eradicate extreme poverty and hunger, to reduce child mortality, to combat diseases and to ensure environmental sustainability.

The Company is limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

There has been no significant change in these activities during the financial year ended 30 June 2023.

Financial Results

The surplus for the financial year after providing for depreciation amounted to €518,119 (2022 - €290,785).

At the end of the financial year, the company has assets of €1,903,627 (2022 - €954,731) and liabilities of €433,237 (2022 - €2,460). The net assets of the company have increased by €518,119.

There were no changes in shareholdings between 30 June 2023 and the date of signing the financial statements.

In accordance with the Constitution, the directors retire by rotation and, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election.

Future Developments

The company plans to continue its present activities and current fundraising efforts.

Phase 1 of the plan to build a new children's village was completed and ready for occupancy in April 2023. The company signed a contract for the construction of phase 2 of the children's village in May 2023. The expected completion date of phase 2 is May 2025. The total outline estimates cost for the children's village is €1,378,378, obviously significant donations will have to be raised if the project is to be completed.

Post Balance Sheet Events

There have been no significant events affecting the company since the financial year-end.

Auditors

CSG Professional Services Limited resigned as auditors during the financial year and the directors appointed F.D.C and Associates Ltd, (Chartered Accountants Ireland and Statutory Auditors), to fill the vacancy.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Tír Na Nóg Children's Foundation Cuideachta Faoi Theorainn Ráthaíochta ('the company') for the financial year ended 30 June 2023 which comprise the Income and Expenditure Account, the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Changes in Equity and the related notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish Law and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", issued in the United Kingdom by the Financial Reporting Council, applying Section 1A of that Standard.

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the assets, liabilities and financial position of the company as at 30 June 2023 and of its surplus for the financial year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", applying Section 1A of that Standard; and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014.

Basis for opinion

1. General Information

Tír Na Nóg Children's Foundation Cuideachta Faoi Theorainn Ráthaíochta is a company limited by guarantee incorporated and registered in Ireland. The registered number of the company is 514748. The registered office of the company is 16 The Kerries, Ballyrickard, Tralee, Co Kerry which is also the principal place of business of the company. The nature of the company's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Directors' Report. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the company.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the financial year ended 30 June 2023 have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of FRS 102 Section 1A (Small Entities) and the Companies Act 2014.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention except for certain properties and financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is the Companies Act 2014 and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" Section 1A, issued by the Financial Reporting Council.

The company qualifies as a small company as defined by section 280A of the Companies Act 2014 in respect of the financial year, and has applied the rules of the 'Small Companies Regime' in accordance with section 280C of the Companies Act 2014 and Section 1A of FRS 102.

Income

Income resources

All incoming resources are included in the Income and Expenditure Account when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Income and Expenditure Account when receivable.
- Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- Incoming resources from charitable trading activity are accounted for when earned.
- Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Fund Accounting

The following funds are operated by the Charity:

Unrestricted Funds:

Unrestricted Funds represent amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the Directors in furtherance of the objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes. Such funds may be held in order to finance working capital or capital expenditure.

Tangible assets and depreciation

(i) Cost

Freehold premises are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

(ii) Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on property on a straight-line basis, so as to write off their cost less residual amounts over their estimated useful economic lives.

The estimated useful economic lives assigned to property are as follows:

Land and buildings freehold	- 4% Straight line
Fixtures, fittings and equipment	- 15% Straight line
Motor vehicles	- 25% Straight line

The company's policy is to review the remaining useful economic lives and residual values of property on an on-going basis and to adjust the depreciation charge to reflect the remaining estimated useful economic life and residual value. Land is not depreciated.

Fully depreciated property are retained in the cost of property and related accumulated depreciation until they are removed from service. In the case of disposals, assets and related depreciation are removed from the financial statements and the net amount, less proceeds from disposal, is charged or credited to the profit and loss account.

(iii) Impairment

Assets not carried at fair value are also reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use. Value in use is defined as the present value of the future pre-tax and interest cash flows obtainable as a result of the asset's continued use. The pre-tax and interest cash flows are discounted using a pre-tax discount rate that represents the current market risk free rate and the risks inherent in the asset. For the purposes of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash flows (cash-generating units).

If the recoverable amount of the asset (or asset's cash generating unit) is estimated to be lower than the carrying amount, the carrying amount is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised in the profit and loss account, unless the asset has been revalued when the amount is recognised in other comprehensive income to the extent of any previously recognised revaluation. Thereafter any excess is recognised in profit or loss.

If an impairment loss is subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or asset's cash generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but only to the extent that the revised carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of depreciation) had no impairment loss been recognised in prior periods. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised in the profit and loss account.

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts except where the effect of discounting would be immaterial. In such cases the receivables are stated at cost less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand, demand deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the Balance Sheet bank overdrafts are shown within Creditors.

Trade and other creditors

Trade and other creditors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

Taxation

No charge to current or deferred taxation arises as the charity has been granted charitable status under Sections 207 and 208 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997, Charity number 20080662.

Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the Balance Sheet date. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined. The resulting exchange differences are dealt with in the Income and Expenditure Account.

9. Status

The company is limited by guarantee not having a share capital and consequently the liability of members is limited, subject to an undertaking by each member to contribute to the net assets or liabilities of the company on winding up of such amounts as may be required not exceeding one Euro (€).

10. Capital commitments

In September 2021, a construction construction was entered into for phase 1 of the construction of the Kao La Amani Children's Village and construction began on the 6th October 2021.

Phase 1 of the plan to build a new children's village was completed and ready for occupancy in April 2023. The company signed a contract for the construction of phase 2 of the children's village in May 2023. The expected completion date of phase 2 is May 2025. The total outline estimates cost for the children's village is €1,378,378, obviously significant donations will have to be raised if the project is to be completed.

11. Related party transactions

An amount of €24,145 was paid to Louise Quill during the year. This payment was reimbursement for expenses wholly, exclusively and necessarily incurred in the performance of her role as director. Directors do not receive remuneration or other benefits from their work with the charity.
